UNV is ready to support the UN partners in Myanmar in deploying volunteer solutions through direct and fast-track recruitments or re-assignments of currently serving UN Volunteers for emergency response and recovery.

UNV offers a wide range of volunteer categories – from UN Community, Youth and Specialist to Expert Volunteers – to fit the needs of our UN partners.



Local Solutions - Fast and Efficient Deployment of National UN Volunteers

Engaging local people in response and recovery as UN Volunteers will help bring local solutions and ensure lasting impacts with sense of ownership. The built-in benefits and entitlements (monthly living allowance; insurance; inclusion in the UN SMS, etc.) will safeguard the people's well-being, safety and security.

The fast-track speedy deployment of National UN Volunteers may vary between 5 and 10 business days from selection to entry on duty.

International Expertise and Myanmar Diaspora Engagement – Remote Assignments

Through this Special Programme Initiative, UNV offers a solution to UN partners to benefit from needed international talents, who cannot be physically present in the country of assignment due to visa, logistics and other challenges especially in the crisis context. At the same time, it offers people opportunities to volunteer for peace and development remotely outside of the country of assignment for the entire duration of their assignment.

In the case of citizens of Myanmar, this Initiative builds on the Transfer of Knowledge Through Expatriate Nationals (TOKTEN), a mechanism that brought back expatriate nationals who had migrated to other countries and achieved professional success to undertake service for their countries of origin.

It is estimated to reduce the proforma cost approximately 30% compared to the standard International UN Volunteer Specialist on-site for 12 months according to the adjusted benefits and entitlements based on the nature of the remote assignments.





Initiate Recruitment Requests

To initiate UN Volunteer recruitment, UNV requires a Description of Assignment (DoA) which serves as Terms of Reference/Job description of the assignment and Service Request Form (SRF)/Funding Authorization. DoA and SRF templates are available online. Click Here.

UNV Good Practice: Response to the Nepal Earthquake

UNV previously supported the UN family in the aftermath of the Nepal Earthquake in 2015, through the UNDP Demolition and Debris Management Project and the Comprehensive Disaster Risk Management Programme. More than 100 UN Volunteers were engaged - mostly engineers by profession, including some experts in agriculture, forestry, accounting and administrative and logistical support. In coordination with UNDP experts on demolition, UN Volunteers undertook the structural assessment of public and private buildings damaged by the earthquake, including schools, health facilities and monasteries. They also supervised cash for-work teams comprised of people from the community who cleared vast quantities of debris scattered in the disaster-hit areas.

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
