

UNV PARTNERING WITH IOM DATA SNAPSHOT

UNV partners with the International Organization for Migration (IOM) to enhance the humane and orderly management of migration and the effective respect for the human rights of migrants in accordance with international law. UN Volunteers help understand people's needs and analyse evidence, and communicate this in order to mobilize international, regional and national partners, including civil society actors. UN Volunteers are ready to address migration challenges hands on to meet the needs of the most vulnerable and build national capacities to respond to humanitarian emergencies with well-coordinated response.

Volunteer action in humanitarian assistance widens spaces for engagement, enhances protection and builds resilience and trust. Volunteerism is intrinsically rooted in SDG 17, and mobilizes people to leverage collective action and engagement across all the SDGs.

During 2016, 35 UN Volunteers served with IOM. IOM invested US \$108,493, with an additional US \$221,398 resource mobilized by UNV through 10 UN Volunteers fully funded by donors and deployed with IOM.

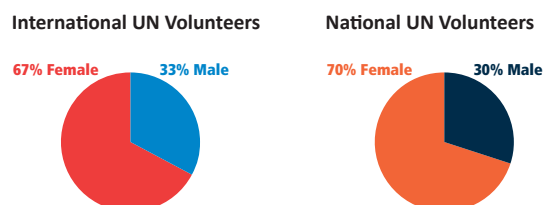

With the Sustainable Development Goals, migration has for the first time been inserted into mainstream development policy. The situation of migrant workers is highlighted in SDG 8 on economic growth and decent work, the issue of trafficking is mentioned SDG 16 on peaceful societies and migration status is mentioned specifically as a factor for disaggregation during the follow-up and review in SDG 17.

Furthermore, SDG 10 aims to reduce inequality within and among countries, and calls, in its target 10.7, for "facilitation of orderly, safe, regular and responsible migration and mobility of people, including through the implementation of planned and well-managed migration policies", and hence encompasses all aspects of migration, which is the centerpiece for migration in the 2030 Agenda.

UNV attaches great importance to gender equality and national capacities, and provides high ratios of female as well as national UN Volunteers, adding to the diversity of IOM's workforce.

UNV and IOM signed an agreement in 1991 for the deployment of UN Volunteers in Iraq to assist in IOM emergency operations, and another in 1992 for the deployment in Cambodia of national UN Volunteers.

In 1994, the first global Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was signed between the two partners, building on collaborative efforts up to then in Iran, Cambodia and Mozambique. This outlined the intention to pursue additional UN Volunteer opportunities in Pakistan and Tajikistan, while increasing collaboration in Mozambique. In 1995, an agreement was signed to cover the air transport by IOM of UN Volunteers serving in humanitarian relief and peace-related assignments.

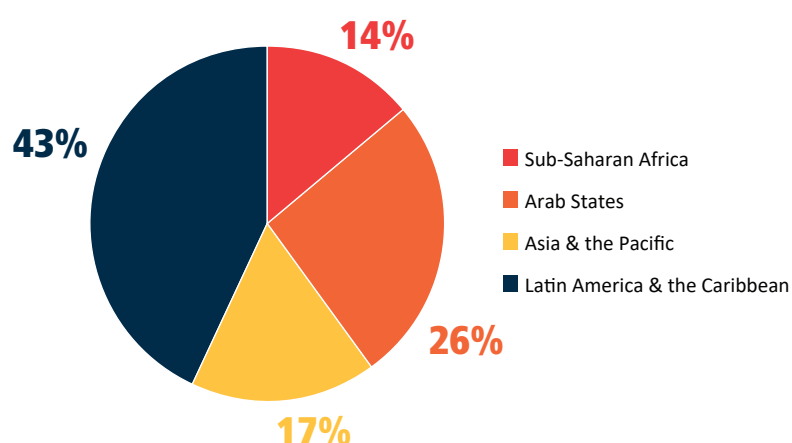
UNV and IOM are currently negotiating a new MOU that is expected to be signed in 2017.



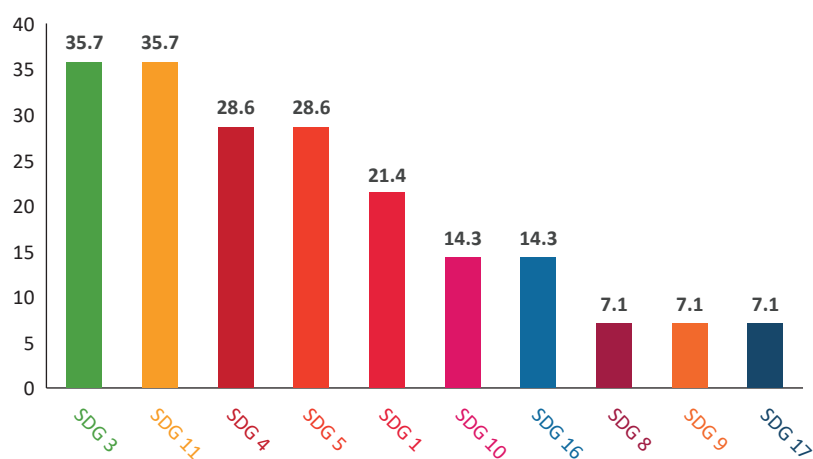

UN Volunteer assignments with IOM by region



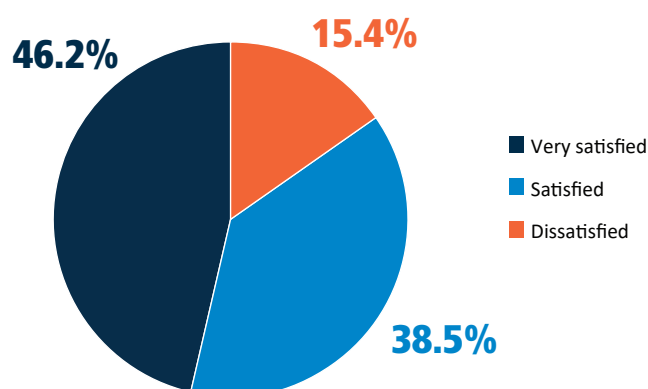
UN Volunteer assignments with IOM contribute to the SDGs
