UNV partners with UNDP to help countries eradicate poverty and reduce inequalities and exclusion. UN Volunteers support inclusive and sustainable growth and development, contribute to giving citizens a voice and strengthen governance systems.

UN Volunteers help reduce the risk of conflict and natural disasters, and support early recovery and sustainable development in post-conflict and post-disaster settings. They strengthen institutions to deliver basic social services, and promote women's empowerment and volunteerism in development discourse at all levels.

Volunteer action in humanitarian crises widens spaces for engagement, enhances protection and builds resilience and trust. Volunteerism is intrinsically rooted in SDG 17, and mobilizes people to leverage collective action and engagement across all the SDGs.

UNDP is UNV's second largest partner, with a financial volume of US \$27 million invested in UN Volunteers in 2016. This represents 16 per cent of total programme expenditure on UN Volunteers by all UN entity partners. During 2016, 1,946 UN Volunteers served with UNDP.







UN Volunteer assignments with UNDP by region (2016)




UN Volunteer assignments with UNDP contribute to the SDGs
